The Inupiat people of the North Slope had traditional ways of governing themselves and settling disputes; the Western justice system is relatively new. There are still no private attorneys living on the North Slope. There had never been a resident Superior Court Judge in Barrow until I took the oath of office in December 1982. The position requires the ability to research and write at a state-wide level of sophistication dealing with current legal issues in cases with attorneys from Anchorage, Fairbanks and Bethel. The position also requires adaptation to the local environment.

The justice system is unavoidably complex and I have taken many steps to help make sure hearings do not dissolve into an unintelligible blur of words. Translation is arranged when needed. Hearings tend to be slower as I try to express myself in a manner which can be more easily understood. The traditional one-page bail order is four pages with explanations in concrete language and locations for a defendant to initial each condition. I respect youth by scheduling their hearings after the school day whenever possible and by interacting with them during the hearing itself. We do

not schedule trials during periods of intense cultural activity (like "Kivgiq", an Eskimo dance festival) and during subsistence hunting (especially the annual bowhead whale hunt). Defendants may be released "third party" to their whaling captains in recognition of the structure and alcohol/substance-free environment in a Spring whaling camp.

Most of the criminal activity in this area is due to the abuse of alcohol. Sometimes a case is so serious that state law and community safety require a very severe sentence, which I impose. Thankfully, such cases are unusual on the North Slope at this time. Most cases allow some flexibility in sentencing, and my sentences almost always include a condition for alcohol/substance abuse treatment. Training I have received on fetal alcohol spectrum disorders also supports having less jail time and more probation supervision for FASD-affected defendants, with no decrease in community safety. I support the efforts of Magistrate Karen Hegyi to use "therapeutic court" principles in the District Court through monthly "compliance hearings" for those on probation with treatment conditions in misdemeanor cases. I join her in presiding over these hearings.

I have found that the support of my family and my faith activities have been extremely important to counteract the stresses of the court house. I believe that having the Superior Court Judge out in the community is important in fostering respect for the judicial system (in addition to giving the judge a more balanced life!). My wife and I coordinate a church youth group, and I am active with Rotary's youth development activities, choir singing, drumming in an Eskimo dance group, and occasional volunteering at the schools. Students also come to the court house for mock trials or tours. The highlights for me have been involvement with seven ecumenical faith-based youth conferences in Barrow and the lower 48, singing hymns (with high school youth) during the school year at the assisted living center, annual commercial salmon set net fishing on Bristol Bay with my family, and a trip to India in February 2007 with Rotary to assist India's efforts to immunize young children against polio.

Michael I. Jeffery was appointed Barrow's first Superior Court Judge by Governor Jay Hammond and began his service there in December 1982. He is familiar with the North Slope's case load of felony and misdemeanor crime, juvenile delinquency, child welfare, domestic relations, probate and civil litigation. He has received specialized training in alcohol/drug addictions and fetal alcohol spectrum disorders.

Originally from Los Angeles, he graduated from Stanford University and Yale Law School, then worked for a year with the Boston Legal Assistance Project, almost died in an automobile accident, spent almost five years in India, then moved to Barrow in January 1977 to establish and work for over five years at the Alaska Legal Services office. He and his wife Esther have three grown children. The family does commercial set net salmon fishing each summer near Dillingham. He is active in Rotary, faith activities, and an Eskimo dance group.

Question 18(c). Have you ever been a party in any other legal proceeding?

1. State & Glaiser, Dir. Of Div. of Elections v. Jeffery & Nolan, ___ P.3d ___, 2007 WL 3332718 (Nov. 9, 2007). Trial Court Case No. 3AN-04-10296 CI. Alaska Supreme Court reversed Superior Court ruling. Supreme Court held that failure of two judges to file a form and \$30 filing fee with the Division of Elections by the August 1, 2004 deadline justified original decision of the Division to keep the judges' names off the 2004 ballot. Based on a Superior Court injunction, the judges' names had appeared on the 2004 ballot and the voters voted to retain both of them. Judges must leave bench by February 15, 2008 but can reapply.
2. Denardo v. Morse et. al. Case No. 3AN-05-11976 CI. Judge Jeffery was one of the many defendants in the case, which was based on a citizen's disagreement with the trial court decision in the above case. The Superior Court dismissed this case on October 23, 2007.
