I am deeply aware of the importance of the position you seek to fill. I once represented a mother who had lost her son on a fishing vessel in Alaska. The son had been brutally murdered by a fellow crewman, stabbed literally dozens of times on his torso and neck, and his arms exhibited many defensive stab wounds. On behalf of the mother we filed suit in federal court against the vessel owner on the theory that the vessel was "unseaworthy." The crewman had already been convicted of first degree murder. Since the essential facts had already been determined beyond a reasonable doubt, we immediately moved for summary judgment in our civil case, citing well-established jurisprudence holding that attacks involving extreme and brutal violence evidence that a crewman is unfit as a matter of law, thereby rendering the vessel unseaworthy. Unfortunately, the case was initially assigned to a judge who had never handled an admiralty case (he said so) and did not fully comprehend that unseaworthiness is a strict liability cause of action. The judge denied our motion, with the result that the parties embarked upon the discovery process. Discovery, of course, takes a good deal of time and money. In this case the judge's ruling was

was particularly unfortunate because - as is typical in maritime liability insurance - the rather meager limits of defendant's liability insurance policy were subject to being reduced even further by defendant's legal costs. defendant fought the case, in other words, the less money was available to compensate the victim's mother. At the conclusion of discovery, and after fruitless attempts to negotiate a settlement, we finally arrived at trial. time the case was reassigned to a judge who had an extensive background in admiralty law. Moreover, the judge was sitting as the trier of fact. In opening remarks to the parties he stated that he had thoroughly reviewed the briefs and made clear that, if it had been his decision, he would have been inclined to grant the original motion for summary judgment. He allowed these few words to hang in the atmosphere of the courtroom until their full implications were realized. At the conclusion of the first day of trial the defendant offered to settle the case for all of the remaining proceeds of the policy. We were grateful the trial judge precipitated the settlement, but by this time the amount available under the policy to indemnify the mother had been reduced by approximately one-third. If the trial judge had been assigned to the case when the motion for summary judgment was filed, the appropriate and just result would have been obtained much earlier and at far less cost.

As a result of this and many other experiences, I am acutely aware of the impact a judge can have for good or ill in a case.

I've also learned that often the impact is made not so much by how the judge decides a particular question, as when the judge rules on it. The truth is that for one party or the other - and sometimes even for both parties - the consequences of a judge's indecision are as real, and potentially deleterious, as an incorrect decision. This is particularly apparent in complex cases, where indecision leads to drift, uncertainty and more litigation. Small-scale disputes, left unattended, escalate out of control. Perhaps lawyers abhor a vacuum but it has been my observation that when they sense a void - such as the void created by lack of judicial supervision - they fill it with paper, and this continues until and unless the active presence of the court is felt by all. Despite all the procedural mechanisms to make civil litigation self-regulating, ultimately it is not self-policing. It never will be. Judges need to be pro-active in monitoring and resolving their cases.
