Alaska Judicial Council Summary of Performance Evaluation for:

Judge Marjorie K. Allard Alaska Court of Appeals

The Judicial Council finds Judge Allard to be **qualified** and recommends unanimously that the public vote "YES" to retain her as a court of appeals judge.

Summary

The Judicial Council's recommendation to vote "YES" on Judge Allard is based on her overall performance, including: evaluations by attorneys and other professionals who have direct experience with Judge Allard; public records; APOC files; and any disciplinary files.

The Council researched other aspects of Judge Allard's performance, such as whether her pay was withheld for untimely decisions. Based on its review of all this information, the Judicial Council recommends a "YES" vote on Judge Allard. Performance evaluation information about Judge Allard is detailed below.

Details

- 1. **Biographical Information.** Judge Allard has been an appeals court judge since 2012. This is her first retention election. For more biographical information about Judge Allard, click here.
- 2. **Survey Ratings.** People who had direct experience with the judge took a survey to rate her on qualities such as legal ability, impartiality and fairness, integrity, judicial temperament, diligence, and overall performance. These survey participants used a 1 to 5 scale to evaluate the judge's performance, where 5.0 was "excellent," 4.0 was "good," 3.0 was "acceptable," 2.0 was "deficient," and 1.0 was "poor."

Attorney Survey Results. Attorneys who responded to the Judicial Council's survey on Judge Allard's performance gave her an average rating of 4.5 overall. For detailed attorney survey results on Judge Allard, click here.

I was appointed by Governor Sean Parnell in November 2012 and began serving as a judge on the Court of Appeals on January 2, 2013.

The last three years have been a turbulent time for the court. Soon after I began, Justice Bolger was appointed to the Supreme Court and, during most of the time I have served, the third judge position has been filled by a series of rotating pro tem judges. Despite these challenges, I have greatly enjoyed my time on the court and have particularly appreciated getting to work with so many outstanding retired appellate judges and current trial court judges. Each of them has brought a wealth of experience and a new perspective to our weekly conferences.

The Alaska Court of Appeals is a high-volume court and its caseload has substantially increased over the past five years. It is also, in most instances, the court of last resort for criminal matters in this state. This combination makes serving as a judge on this court extraordinarily difficult but also uniquely rewarding.

I have worked hard to try to address the criminal appellate backlog that still faces our court. In the last three years, I have personally issued over 150 opinions and memorandum opinions and participated in over 400 decisions by the court. I have also been actively involved in trying to find workable solutions for the continuing problem of appellate delay.

I also continue to work hard to maintain the high degree of analytical rigor, thoroughness, and clarity that have been the hallmark of this court for so long. I approach each case with a clean slate and an open mind, and I carefully review the briefing and trial court record for each matter before me. I prepare diligently for each conference with the other judges (often there are multiple conferences because of the different pro tem judges), and I am learning how best to take advantage of the opportunities provided by oral argument. I greatly enjoy the group decision-making that defines a multi-judge appellate court and I believe that I continue to grow both as a judge and as a person through my daily interactions with my colleagues, the law clerks, the staff attorneys, the judicial assistants, the case managers, and the other people who work directly with the court.

It is a true privilege to serve the State of Alaska through my work on the Alaska Court of Appeals and I am honored to have this opportunity.

Salary Warrant Withholding

Alaska law states: "A salary disbursement may not be issued to a [justice or judge] until the [justice or judge] has filed with the state officer designated to issue salary disbursements an affidavit that no matter referred to the [justice or judge] for opinion or decision has been uncompleted or undecided by the judge for a period of more than six months." As soon as the judge completes or decides the matter and signs the affidavid, the salary warrant may be issued.

No appellate judge had any salary warrants withheld. The appellate judges on the 2016 ballot are Supreme Court Justice Peter Maassen, Supreme Court Justice Joel Bolger, and Court of Appeals Judge Marjorie Allard.

Of the sixteen superior court judges on the ballot in 2016, two had pay withheld during the evaluation period:
