# Alaska Judicial Council Recommendation Judge Trevor Stephens, Superior Court, Ketchikan

*I. Judicial Council Evaluation.* The Alaska Judicial Council, a non-partisan citizens commission established by the Alaska Constitution, finds Judge Stephens to be *Qualified* and recommends unanimously (6-0) that the public vote "YES" to retain him as a superior court judge.

**II.** Summary of Evaluation Information. A survey of 2,927 attorneys in Alaska rated Judge Stephens on sixteen categories that are summarized in the adjacent graph. Attorneys rated Judge Stephens 4.4 on a scale of 5 on overall judicial performance. He scored 4.4 or better in all sixteen categories.



Ratings are based on a one to five scale. Five is the best rating and three is "acceptable." <u>Rating Scale</u> 5.0 = Excellent 4.0 = Good 3.0 = Acceptable 2.0 = Deficient 1.0 = Poor

A survey of 1,495 peace and probation officers in Alaska rated Judge Stephens on twelve categories that are summarized in the adjacent graph. Peace and probation officers rated Judge Stephens 4.7 on a scale of 5 on overall judicial performance. He scored 4.6 or better in all categories.

A survey of jurors appearing before Judge Stephens in 2002 and 2003 rated him 4.8 on a scale of 5 on overall performance. A survey of all court employees rated him 4.9 on a scale of 5 on overall performance.

The Council also completed a background investigation including a court records check, a disciplinary records check, a review of conflict of interest statements submitted to the court system and a review of financial disclosure statements submitted to the Alaska Public Offices Commission. Attorneys, peace officers, court employees and jurors were asked to submit written comments about the judge. The Council actively encouraged the public to comment, both in writing and in a statewide public hearing teleconference.

The pre-retention surveys reflect that my overall performance has been satisfactory to the groups surveyed. I believe that my judicial performance has steadily improved. When I started I understood the following. First, judges make decisions and generally at least one of the parties will not be pleased with any given decision. Second, the outcome of a case (civil and criminal) is of vital importance to the parties. Third, there were areas of the law in which I was relatively inexperienced (i.e. child and protective proceedings). Fourth, a judge has public obligations. As a result, my goals have been to strengthen my knowledge base, to make decisions in a manner that assures the parties that I have fully and fairly considered the matter, and to take steps to foster public respect for and understanding of the judicial system. To those ends I have worked hard to be well-prepared, thorough, consistent, fair, courteous, prompt, available, and to render decisions that are based on the facts in the record and applicable law and which plainly explain to the parties in detail what I decided and why.

The specific steps that I have taken include the following. Preparing extensive bench books and new protective proceeding, Omnibus Hearing and Pre-Trial Scheduling Conference forms. Preparing informational handouts for pro se litigants. Implementing a system for tracking the performance of third-party custodians. Efforts to increase juror understanding and convenience. Spending considerable time at arraignments and changes of plea explaining to defendant's their rights and options. Spending considerable time at sentencing explaining the sentence and the basis for the same. Participating in the planning and production of our local Law Day activities. Hosting groups of students at the court building. Speaking in the schools in Ketchikan and on Prince of Wales Island. Teaching the Ketchikan Youth Court class.

#### Summary of Findings:

Judge Trevor Stephens was evaluated by 87 Alaska Bar Association members who reported having direct professional experience with this judge. Of these 87 respondents, 43 (49.4%) had substantial and recent experience, 20 (23.0%) had moderate experience, 21 (24.1%) had limited experience, and 3 (3.5%) did not indicate level of experience. The mean score on the overall evaluation item was 4.4. The highest mean scores were obtained on *conduct free from impropriety or appearance of impropriety* (4.6) and *willingness to work diligently; preparation for hearings* (4.6). The lowest mean scores were obtained on *legal and factual analysis* (4.4), *knowledge of evidence and procedure* (4.4), *equal treatment of all parties* (4.4), *human understanding and compassion* (4.4), and *ability to control courtroom* (4.4). Details are presented in the two tables that follow.

#### Summary of Findings:

Judge Trevor Stephens was evaluated by 37 Peace and Probation Officers who reported having direct professional experience with this judge. Of these 37 respondents, 13 (35.1%) had substantial and recent experience, 15 (40.5%) had moderate experience, 9 (40.5%) had limited experience, and 0 (0.0%) did not indicate level of experience. The mean score on the overall evaluation item was 4.7. The highest mean score was obtained on *sense of basic fairness and justice* (4.8). The lowest mean scores were obtained on *courtesy, freedom from arrogance* (4.6), *reasonable promptness in making decisions* (4.6), and *ability to control courtroom* (4.6). Details are presented in the two tables that follow.

Of these 5 respondents, 3 (60.0%) had substantial and recent experience, 1 (20.0%) had moderate experience, 1 (20.0%) had limited experience, and 0 (0.0%) did not indicate level of experience. The mean score on the overall evaluation item was 4.8. The highest mean score was 4.8 and was obtained on all categories except *talent and ability for cases involving children and families*, in which he obtained a score of 4.6.
