# Alaska Judicial Council Recommendation Judge Douglas L. Blankenship, Superior Court, Fairbanks

#### Judicial Council Recommendation 2010

The Alaska Judicial Council is a non-partisan citizens' commission established by the Alaska constitution. Alaskan law requires the Council to evaluate judges' performance and authorizes the Council to recommend to voters whether judges should be retained in office. The Judicial Council reviews judges' integrity, diligence, legal ability, fairness, demeanor, ability to manage their caseloads, and overall performance of their judicial responsibilities in and out of the courtroom. The Judicial Council finds Judge Blankenship to be **Qualified** and recommends unanimously that the public vote "**YES**" to retain him as a superior court judge.

#### Judicial Council Evaluation

The Judicial Council surveyed thousands of Alaskans including peace and probation officers, court employees, attorneys, jurors, social workers/guardians ad litem, and child advocates about the judges on the ballot. Respondents were asked to rate judicial performance and to submit comments. The Council also reviewed the ratings and observations of the Alaska Judicial Observers, independent community-based volunteers. The Council reviewed the judge's peremptory challenge, recusals, and appellate affirmance and reversal rates; any civil or criminal litigation involving the judge; APOC and court system conflict-of-interest statements; any disciplinary files involving the judge; and whether a judge's pay was withheld for an untimely decision. The Council reviewed other court records and investigated judicial conduct in specific cases. The Council interviewed some judges, attorneys, and court staff, and held a statewide public hearing to obtain comments about judges.

### Summary of Survey Information

Survey respondents rated Judge Blankenship on the categories summarized in the table above, using 5 as the highest rating possible. The attorney rating for Judge Blankenship on overall performance was 3.6. Peace and probation officers gave Judge Blankenship a rating of 4.0. Jurors rated him 4.6 overall, court employees gave him 4.2, and social workers, guardians ad litem and CASA volunteers rated him at 4.3.

I commenced my service as a judge in May 2006. From then until August, 2007, when DA Gray was appointed, the Fairbanks court as a whole probably heard three or four times more trials than now.

2. Please describe your participation on court/bar committees or other administrative activities during your current term of office.

I am a member of the Civil Rules Committee and the CINA Court Improvement Project (CIP). The Civil Rules Committee meets twice a year. The CIP is a group of about 16 members (consisting of judges, magistrates, and representatives from the Department of Law, the PD's, OPA, and OCS, and a Tribal rep.) that meets quarterly work on improving the CINA system and make it more it more efficient. I have also been the presiding judge for the Fourth Judicial District since January 2008. The Fourth Judicial District includes Fairbanks and Bethel, nine rural magistrates and three magistrates in Fairbanks. Appropriate areas of comment could include: satisfaction with your judicial role, specific contributions to the judiciary or the field of law, increases in legal knowledge and judicial skills, or other measures of judicial abilities that you believe to be important.

I enjoy the role of judge. I believe we have a good stable of judges in Fairbanks. We get along and we work hard. Personally I enjoy trying to solve the legal questions that confront me from time to time. Getting to the right answer through research and writing is a source of satisfaction. Another facet of judging is communicating with the parties such as the defendant in criminal matter, the parents in a CINA case, and the parents in a domestic relation custody cases. For example, at a sentencing for an offense or a PTR violation in my comments or a colloquy with the defendant, I hope to communicate a sincere interest in the defendant. In conversions with defense bar members, the defense attorneys encourage the comments by the judges to let the defendants know the judges are interested in them. It is important to me to let the parties know that I am engaged in the matter I am deciding.

Since I started judging my knowledge of the law has increased. As was true in my practice, I do almost all of the research in my cases myself. I had a system of electronic research retention and filing that I still use.

In trying to be a good judge the characteristics I practice are fairness, being considerate to attorneys and parties and court staff, listening and being open to arguments, decisiveness in decision-making, efficient time manager so decisions are promptly made, good work ethic, being prepared for hearings, ability to apply legal reasoning in application of law to facts, clear writer, and clear oral presenter. I aspire to fully master all these qualities. I believe I have a good work ethic and I am prepare for hearings. Time management is an important quality and something I continually try to improve. I believe I am considerate to parties and counsel in the courtroom. One area that I know needs improvement is getting family law decisions issued in a more timely fashion.

## 2. cont'd

I organized a group (OCS director, statewide AG Human Services section chief, OPA representative, Public Defender representative) to focus solely on Bethel CINA issues.

I am also the presiding judge and leader of the Fairbanks Juvenile Treatment Court (FJTC). The FJTC commenced in August 2008. The FJTC diverts eligible youth from the traditional juvenile delinquency court system to a specialized therapeutic court designed to address the mental health needs of the youth. The FJTC functions through a multidisciplinary team ("MDT") of professionals (judge, district attorney, defense attorney, probation officer, and mental health consultant). The concept of the FJTC encourages collaboration and teamwork among the MDT team members which meet regularly to review case plan progress and determine appropriate actions to be taken in furtherance of the case plan. The maximum number of youth in the court is 20. This court takes about 1 to 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  days per week of my time.

As presiding judge of the Fourth Judicial District, I must deal with administrative issues. I am blessed to have a very capable and experienced Area Court Administrator and Clerks of Court in Bethel and Fairbanks who handle almost all administrative issues for the court. Although the ACA and clerks of court handle many of the issues, on a weekly basis they each bring issues to my attention requiring a PJ decision. As PJ, I must also deal with court calendaring issues, magistrate selection, and performance issues. I also handle inquiries from the public counsel office chiefs, private counsel, and other inquires. I estimate the PJ duties consume about one day a week.

Finally one initiative I am implementing for the rural Alaska magistrates is "Circuit Magistrates." Magistrates are now located in Fairbanks, Tok, Delta Junction, and Nenana on the highway system. Rural magistrates are in Ft. Yukon, Galena, Aniak/McGrath, St. Marys, Emmonak, and Chevak. As I have worked on PJ issues relating to rural Alaska I have recognized that there is a void of a state presence in rural Alaska. To address this in the context of the court system I have asked our rural magistrates if they could come up with a plan to hold court as needed in communities in the vicinity of the exiting magistrate locations. All rural magistrates have enthusiastically embraced the concept. In the next six months or so I hope to have a written plan to include as many rural villages as reasonably possible in each magistrate's "circuit."

Along with the personal observations of the hundreds of people who had direct professional experience with the judge, the Council reviews any litigation involving the judge, conflict of interest records, public disciplinary files, and indicators of judicial performance such as appellate affirmances and reversals, and peremptory challenges and recusals.
