ADDENDUM TO #12

I have been on numerous Alaska Court System or Anchorage District Court committees for over twenty years. All committees have been heavily involved with developing policies, procedures and practice in the Anchorage District Court.

<u>Criminal Justice Assessment Commission (CJAC)-Decriminalizing the Mentally III subcommittee</u> (1997)—CJAC was a statewide commission working with National Institute of Corrections to develop more cost-effective and cooperative systems of criminal justice. From our subcommittee we helped create the CRP court.

<u>CRP Court</u> ad hoc committee (1997-8)—Represented the law firm at organizing meetings for development of the CRP court. At the court's request my law partner and I agreed to exclusively staff this court in 1998 in order to develop long term consistency with the court and our particularly vulnerable clients. We did this for the next sixteen years. I have staffed it full time for the past three years.

<u>Alaska Veterans Court</u> ad hoc committee (2004)—Part of organizing group for the first veterans specialty court in the United States including starting it a "rogue" operation, eventually mainstreaming it by developing policies and procedures, working with VA and Vet Center to coordinate treatment and court needs. I staffed this court exclusively for the first several years until it was up and running. I have staffed it full time for the past three years.

Anchorage District Court Petition To Revoke Probation (PTRP) Adjudication/Disposition Project (2006/2017)—Part of organizing group experimenting with a therapeutic model for handling alcohol, DVIP, and community work service PTRPs, with emphasis on centralized, court-supervised completion of these requirements, and consistent consequences for continued non-compliance. We are currently revisiting the model after eleven years to see what adjustments are necessary. I staffed this court on a full time basis for several until it was up and running.

OWL (Operating without License) Court ad hoc committee—Part of organizing group developing specialty court aimed at helping drivers obtain operators licenses in exchange for reduction or dismissal of DWLR charges. DWLR cases accounted for a large percentage of the district court caseload and possibly a larger percentage of misdemeanor jail time being imposed by the court. Previous diversion efforts were only marginally effective, so it was decided to develop a court-supervised program instead.

I have practiced law in Alaska courts since 1988. Since 1999 I have either supervised or managed five lawyers and support staff working on the Anchorage indigent defender contract, handling over 4000 cases a year. During this time and while a prosecutor in Brooklyn, New York, I have tried approximately 120 cases in district and superior courts, in both the criminal and civil cases.

As this application indicates, I have balanced my role as an advocate with extensive collaborative work in the Anchorage district court. I have been on various committees and working groups addressing the structure and function of the court, as well as the development, implementation and continuing operation of its three major therapeutic courts (Wellness, Vet, and CRP Courts). I have worked with prosecuting agencies to help streamline discovery, cut down on pleadings and develop shared positions regarding court matters.

As a district court judge I will be able to use this experience in several important ways.

First, my professional experience is well suited to this particular position. The

I believe it had to do with a client who changed his plea on an OUI and DWLR charge. He complained that I did not request that the sentences run concurrently. At that time and OUI sentence was not allowed to run concurrently with any other sentence, so there was no legal basis for the complaint.

A judge filed a grievance concerning a potential conflict Gorton & Logue may have had in its representation of two clients.

Bar counsel found that no conflict existed. The judge filed for reconsideration and bar counsel again found that no conflict existed.

Additional Comments (Continued)

Anchorage district court is the largest, busiest and most varied court in Alaska. It deals with an extremely large diverse population of customers, many of whom are unrepresented and have access issues (language, cultural, mental health, homelessness, etc.). Each brings their individual problems before the court in search of justice. I have spent the bulk of my career in this environment. In addition to having a strong understanding of the legal issues which commonly come before this court, I am comfortable working with the sheer crush of humanity and cases which the court sees every day.

Second, I have been fully committed since Day One to the tremendous therapeutic court programs we have developed in the district court. The CRP and Vet Court are two of the oldest such courts in the United States (CRP, #4, Vet Court #1). If given the opportunity I will continue to do whatever I can to maintain their vitality and continue their development.

Third, there is little glamour in this job. The daily crush of cases, the disappointments and small indignities never go away. A judge is this particular court is expected to embrace and immerse themselves in them. It is not a stop along the way to the next level but a destination in itself. I am fully cognizant of this and I look forward to taking on the challenges of this particular position.
