Continuation of question 10 (nature of legal practice):

Since January 2003 I have had a full-time appellate practice in the Office of Criminal Appeals, representing the state in appeals from criminal convictions and from superior court decisions in post-conviction relief actions. Most of my work is before the court of appeals, with the remainder before the supreme court. I also occasionally represent the state in federal habeas cases. My practice requires frequent interaction with trial prosecutors seeking advice about their cases.

From April 1992 through January 2003 I represented the Department of Corrections ("DOC"), the Parole Board, and occasionally the Department of Public Safety. My DOC practice encompassed a wide variety of litigation – approximately (a) 38 administrative appeals to superior court from prison disciplinary decisions, (b) 46 civil rights cases in state (22) and federal (24) court where I represented DOC employees sued in their individual capacity, (c) 30 post-conviction relief actions in state court and habeas actions in federal court (issues other than the merits of underlying convictions, typically time-accounting claims where the inmate challenged DOC's sentence calculations), (d) motions to correct an illegal sentence, and (e) discovery matters in civil and criminal cases where one party sought access to DOC's inmate, personnel, or probation/ parole files. I appeared personally before the state and federal courts with relative frequency, typically at hearings on motions for summary judgment, for injunctive relief, or involving discovery. And since DOC counsel handle their own appeals, I engaged in a significant amount of practice before Alaska's appellate courts and the Ninth Circuit. As with my current practice, there was frequent interaction with trial prosecutors as I assisted them with DOC-related aspects of their cases.

When the volume of corrections-related litigation began to decline due to the passage of the federal and state prison litigation reform acts, representation of the Department of Administration's Division of Motor Vehicles ("DMV") was added to my duties. I litigated approximately 50 administrative appeals in superior court from driver's license revocation actions, as well as some appeals to the supreme court from superior court decisions. The issues typically concerned the validity of the initial stop and whether the police officer followed the procedures for DUI cases. I also represented several DMV administrators who were sued in federal court in a civil rights action.

I have briefed 30 cases in the Alaska Supreme Court (11 in criminal cases and 19 in cases involving variously the Departments of Corrections, Health and Social Services, Public Safety, and DMV). I have briefed 216 cases in the Alaska Court of Appeals (201 in criminal cases and 15 in DOC-related litigation). I have litigated 115 petitions for hearing or review, mostly responding to them but occasionally representing the state in its capacity as petitioner. I have also briefed 7 appeals before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals and drafted and filed as lead counsel an amicus brief in the United States Supreme Court on behalf of Alaska and 10 other states in *Danforth v. Minnesota*, 552 U.S. 264, 128 S.Ct. 1029 (2008).

I also handled several litigation projects outside my normal scope of duties, including a Medicaid fraud administrative appeal, a concealed handgun permit administrative appeal, and two public bid contract administrative appeals involving vendors who lost contracts with DOC, all four of which I litigated through to successful decisions from the Alaska Supreme Court. I also pursued a torts action against an insurance company to recover for damages to a state trooper vehicle.

The legislature has passed a number of major crime bills in the last four years, leading to an increase in appeals as litigants dispute the meaning of new or amended statutory provisions. The caseload problem has been exacerbated by the retirement of former Court of Appeals Chief Judge David Mannheimer, who was a uniquely productive judge. The Court of Appeals has responded to this challenge by implementing such measures as issuing summary dispositions in cases where that is warranted, as well as using retired judges to assist the court. The legislature's addition of a fourth seat on the court represents a new effort to address the court's workload, and I believe that my experience will allow me contribute to the effort to deal with the court's caseload and reduce its backlog. I believe that it is possible for the court to make progress in this area without sacrificing an accurate and fair evaluation of each case.

I care deeply about the administration of criminal justice in Alaska. The appellate courts play a vital role as a safety valve, ensuring litigants that serious errors will be corrected, and help to provide needed guidance on the law. I have the ability to explain legal principles clearly
