Alaska Judicial Council Recommendation Judge Daniel Schally, District Court, Valdez

Judicial Council Recommendation

The Alaska Judicial Council, a non-partisan citizens commission established by the Alaska constitution, evaluates judges on criteria that include legal ability, demeanor, diligence, ability to manage their caseloads, and fairness and integrity. The Judicial Council finds Judge Schally to be **Qualified** and recommends unanimously that the public vote "YES" to retain him as a district court judge.

Judicial Council Evaluation

The Judicial Council surveyed 2,884 attorneys and 1,539 peace and probation officers, together with social workers/guardians ad litem, and child advocates, jurors, and court employees about the judges on the ballot. Respondents were asked to rate judicial performance and to submit comments. The Council also reviewed the ratings and observations of the Alaska Judicial Observers, independent community-based volunteers. The Council reviewed court system records concerning peremptory challenges, recusals, and appellate affirmance and reversal rates; any civil or criminal litigation involving the judge; APOC and court system conflict-of-interest statements; any public disciplinary files; and whether a judge's pay was withheld for an untimely decision. The Council investigated judicial conduct in specific cases. The Council interviewed some judges, attorneys, court staff, and others, and held a statewide public hearing to obtain comments about judges.

Summary of Survey Information


Attorneys in Alaska rated Judge Schally on the six categories summarized in the table above, using 5 as the highest rating possible. The attorney rating for Judge Schally on overall performance was 4.1. Peace and probation officers rated Judge Schally on five categories, using the 5-point scale above. They gave Judge Schally a rating of 4.5.

Three other groups also evaluated Judge Schally's performance, using the same 5-point scale with 5 as the highest rating. Jurors rated him 4.8 overall, court employees gave him 4.4, and social workers, guardians ad litem and CASA volunteers rated him at 5.0.

Recommendation: Vote "YES" to retain Judge Daniel Schally

I was appointed by Supreme Court Order No. 1608 to the Fish & Game Bail Forfeiture Schedule Advisory Committee in 2006. As part of that committee I reviewed proposed changes to the schedule, asked questions and made comments about the proposed changes.

I have advised Chief Justice Fabe of my desire to be appointed to the Criminal Rules Committee or similar committee.

I manage the weekend and holiday judicial on-call schedule for Valdez, Glennallen, and Sand Point, which applies to judicial officers in Valdez and Glennallen.

I wanted to flesh out the numbers I listed on the previous page and make sure the council is aware of how cases are handled at the three courts where I serve. For Valdez and Sand Point I am assigned virtually all cases of every description. The only exceptions are the highest level felonies, and that exception has only been in place since about July 1, 2006 when the pro tem policy was changed by incoming Chief Justice Fabe. As to Glennallen cases my involvement is more limited because Magistrate Wilkinson is a high level magistrate and has master authority and therefore she handles most matters even at the superior court level. I review work she handles as master and I handle matters not covered by her master's appointment order. I handle trial and motion work in most all cases of all descriptions.

In addition to cases from Valdez, Sand Point, and Glennallen, I am routinely assigned appeals from both the Palmer and Anchorage courts. These include appeals from the district to superior court, and administrative appeals.

The numbers on the previous page are averages and estimates, blending numbers from Valdez, Sand Point, and Glennallen for most types of cases and blending in numbers from Palmer and Anchorage in the administrative appeals category.

3. Please assess, in one or two paragraphs, your judicial performance during your present term. Appropriate areas of comment could include: satisfaction with your judicial role, specific contributions to the judiciary or the field of law, increases in legal knowledge and judicial skills, or other measures of judicial abilities that you believe to be important.

I think I've done a good job. I have worked extremely hard to get up to speed in various areas of law in which I did not practice as an attorney and I believe I have succeeded in this goal. I do not pretend that I know everything about all the areas in which I am required to work, but I have learned a lot about a lot of different areas in a relatively short time.

There are moments when I absolutely love this job. They are not always the same sorts of moments and sometimes they surprise me. I have taken great satisfaction in resolving cases without trial (these have usually been small claims cases where the parties are without counsel and really do not have a great depth of knowledge of the law or even of their own claims). I have enjoyed conducting weddings. The few adoptions I have done have been joyous occasions. I have been surprised at myself for my depth of feeling in juvenile delinquency cases where I have really tried to impress upon a young person both the bad things they have done or that they need to address and also the great potential that they have as people. Really talking to people has proven to be a great experience. I like to think that what I have said has actually made a difference in people's lives, especially young people.

In the area of criminal law I have been learning to explore and enjoy a different role in the legal process than that I fulfilled as an attorney.

I've always possessed a pedantic streak and this job has provided an outlet for those energies. I have taught Youth Court classes here in Valdez and have hosted a court visit for cub scouts working on a citizenship badge. I have taught (along with a DA and PD and police officer) the finer points of domestic violence restraining orders and related law to domestic violence advocates. I've gone on the radio in Valdez and Sand Point to explain a bit about the law and my job. I have also had a million and one conversations with people about various aspects of my job and the law. The one thing I have learned is that there is always room for more knowledge about our legal system and it is a sad wonder to me that many citizens do not have a firm grasp of many of the basics. To the extent I can make a small dent in this problem, I have striven to do so.

When sentencing defendants I have also tried very hard to make sure that they not only understand the sentence being imposed but also the reasons underlying the sentence. I always, always, always ask questions of people to make sure they understand what they are doing (e.g., when entering a plea to a crime). Acting without knowledge or understanding can, of course, lead to severe problems, and it is a goal of mine to not have people in cases assigned to me act without knowledge or understanding.

Judging is not just about making decisions but rather it is about being ready, willing, and able to explain the reasons for the decisions one makes. Being a real person and taking the time (which as a judge in a smaller, less busy court I have the luxury of having) to interact with people makes a huge difference. I believe I have made a difference.

Evaluation of Judge Daniel Schally: Alaska Bar Association Members

Summary of Findings

Judge Daniel Schally was evaluated by 70 Alaska Bar Association members who reported having direct professional experience with the judge. The mean score on *overall* evaluation was 4.1. The highest mean score was obtained on *integrity* (4.3) and the lowest mean scores were obtained on *legal ability, impartiality/fairness*, and *judicial* temperament (4.1). Details are presented in the two tables that follow.


